A really great piece of news for cyclists was reported in "Bicycle Network" that relates to safe passing laws.

"Minimum passing distance laws will be introduced in 2021 and rules will be like those in other states and territories. People on bikes will need to be passed at a minimum distance of one metre on roads with speed limits up to 60km/h, and 1.5 metres on roads with speed limits above 60km/h."

This law is long overdue and to be greatly welcomed.

Another of the gems to come out of lockdown was this offering by Danielle Matthews - "Bin Lady". We really are a very creative lot. Adversity brings out the best in some.

Those of you who are regular riders along the Diamond Creek trail will have seen the very exciting development taking place. The long awaited Hurstbridge extension to the trail is well underway. E-Bike information

We have a number of e-bike riders in our club, so the following information will be of interest. The next time you feel challenged to take your valuable asset through deep water, don't. It could be very costly.

"It is simply a no-go to work on the components of an eBike with high pressure, <u>as water can penetrate into the bearings of the motor</u>, hubs or rear frame."

"One situation in particular that you should be aware of in terms of getting your e-bike wet is riding through deep puddles or streams. While it may be tempting to "test the waters," it won't seem like such a good idea when you cause serious damage to such an expensive piece of equipment.


While raindrops falling won't typically impact your bike, it's a completely different story when you submerge your vehicle. Just like it wouldn't be ideal to drive a car through a river, you don't want to take your e-bike through anything resembling a stream."

Waterproofing against splash and rain is relatively simple but submersion is very different. If high pressure is a no no I suspect submersion will also result in water entry. Problem is the rapid cooling lowers the pressure inside.

The following is what happened to one e-bike ride from Darebin BUG.


Rogers "Submarine Bike" Motor


This is what happens when you take your electric bike for a "swim". Note the water is sucked in when the warm motor is cooled by the cold water it is submersed in. The contracting air within the hub sucks water into the hub through the bearing seals.



This shows the internal parts of the geared hub. It is called a planetary gear system.

There is a sun gear which cannot be seen in the pictures. This is attached to the motor. It turns 3 planet gears which then turn the ring gear. The ring gear is attached to the wheel hub thus the wheel turns
