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E-Bikes on the move

E-bike fires prompt train ban - (From BN)

Thousands of e-bike riders could be deprived of their rights to take their bikes on trains following moves by state governments to outlaw e-bikes and e-scooters from trains because of the risk of battery fires.

Such a ban would result in a major disruption to the day-to-day lives of many Australians.

E-bikes have rapidly increased in popularity in recent years and now comprise a fundamental part of our transport mix. (Link)

Coroner highlights e-motorbike issue (From BN)

A Victorian coroner has drawn attention to the major regulatory failure which is threatening the future of e-bike transport in Australia.

Many of the so-called e-bikes in our bike lanes and along our shared paths are not e-bikes at all – by law they are electric motorcycles.

The bikes have been modified to be more powerful and travel faster than the law permits, they are often controlled by hand-operated throttles and the riders don't have to pedal at all in many cases. (Link)

UKRAINE Niamh Robinson

An injured Ukrainian soldier stranded for several days behind enemy lines managed to escape after being delivered an e-bike by a drone.

Footage shared by the Rubizh brigade appears to show an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) winching the bicycle down to the wounded man, who was reportedly surrounded by Russian forces, before he cycles away at speed.


The brigade said three of its troops had been killed by enemy fire during the operation around Siversk in northern Ukraine, leaving the remaining soldier to hold down the position alone.

Speaking to camera, the soldier, call sign "Tanker", said: "Our drones covered us from above as best as they could. Then they threw two gas cylinders straight into our hole and a lighter. We caught fire."

Sustaining a leg injury in the attack, the remaining soldier was unable to evacuate without assistance.

"Every day, I was surrounded, from all sides. I fought back as best I could," he said, adding he was stranded there for four or five days.

The brigade's Mykola Gritsenko said a rescue team could not reach the wounded soldier without risking

its own safety. "It was impossible to drive up with equipment because the enemy was everywhere. He couldn't get out on his own either because he had to walk 1.5 kilometres to the nearest position.

"In his condition, with his injuries and lower limbs, he simply wouldn't have made it."

It was at this point the brigade decided to airlift an e-bike to the wounded soldier using a drone.

Drones have become an integral tool in Ukraine's armoury during its war with Russia, allowing troops to navigate behind enemy lines without risking soldiers' lives.

But while the remotely operated technology is generally loaded with explosives and used for offensive purposes, there is little evidence of it being used in evacuation situations. The Battalion Freedom Force brigade said two attempts to deliver the bike to the wounded servicemen were unsuccessful, with the vehicle first being shot down and then the drones' motors burning out.

But a third effort proved successful, with the soldier making it 400 metres on the electric bike before hitting a remote mine and being thrown into the air.

He limped a further 200 metres before being met by his comrades and pulled to safety. A second e-bike was then delivered to the wounded soldier, which he rode for 15 minutes until he reached a safe zone and could be evacuated.

"To carry out this operation, they had to calculate the right time of day, the right weather conditions that would allow him to do it," Gritsenko said.

"The weight of this electric bike itself reaches almost 40kg."

This latest footage emerged as Russia launched a wave of drone and missile attacks on Kyiv overnight, killing 16 people, including a six-year-old boy and his mother, Ukrainian officials said.

The offensive targeted 27 locations across the capital, including the children's ward of a hospital in Shevchenkivskyi district, they added. The Telegraph, London


This is the madness and mayhem playing out on the streets and in the parks of Melbourne. It is terrifying for those victims involved and has resulted in serious injury.


Recently, in my local shopping strip, I witnessed an elderly E-Bike rider being berated by a member of the public for riding an E-Bike.

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E-bike train ban encounters the Opposition

The State Opposition has announced it will oppose the proposed ban of e-bikes on trains.

Shadow Minister for Public Transport, Matthew Guy, said it made no sense to encourage people to use e-bikes and e-scooters but outlaw them on public transport.

"E-bikes and e-scooters are now an important part of sustainable alternative transport," said Guy.

"Banning their carriage on trains and trams and limiting their broader use is a gross over-reaction to a very small number of incidents involving this mode of transport, across international rail networks."

The state government's proposed e-bike ban<https://bicyclenetwork.com.au/newsroom/2025/07/24/e-bike-fires-prompt-train-ban/> follows incidents in Melbourne and other cities involving e-bike batteries overheating on trains.

The proposal is currently out for public consultationhttps://engage.vic.gov.au/public-transport-regulations.

Guy suggested the proposed ban was not a solution to this problem and would go against the government's own commitments to encouraging active transport.

"Given the mobility and flexibility e-bikes and e-scooters provide to a growing number of Victorians, the government should be encouraging their use in a properly regulated and sustainable active transport market, not limiting their use to short distances from people's homes," he said.

"The Liberals and Nationals are committed to working with industry and safety experts to ensure a sensible, well-regulated framework for the use and carriage of e-bikes and e-scooters."

Bicycle Network encourages bike riders to make a submission to the consultation so that a full range of views can be considered.

We are working closely with industry partners and governments to quickly implement rigorous federal and state regulation that ensures that only fully standards-compliant e-bikes and their batteries are permitted on Australian roads.


Without the worry of these risk sub-standard bikes, there will be no reason for the train ban. (Return)
